3rd Part.

Here we have the solutions that we, as students, have found to be perfect for them.

1) Sayid: Because of the diabetes, he's not able to eat food which contains a high level of sugar. So, in order not to have high sugar in the blood, he prevents eating sweet aliments. He started to look for jobs, but because of being a refugee, most of the shops, companies, etc doesn't want him. At least, he found a job in a supermarket of a syrian family being a food shelf-filler.

2) Rasha: after all, she is a very strong and brave woman. Thanks to the help of her sons and daughters and of other women refugees that were in the same conditions, she came out from the depression that didn't let her breathe and found a stable job, been a seamstress in a clothes shop.

3) Qamar: She started going to school, but she really doesn't think that she fit in that. She hasn't made any friends because they were all pulling she apart and leaving her alone. Although she is a 10 years old girl, because of all that occurred during this time, she has matured and her thoughts are like a 16 years old girl. At home, she starts to know the difficulties that her family has so she helps her mother and father as much as she could. Finally, a girl called Alba started to talk with her and thanks to her, the classmates of Qamar started to respect Qamar, so she made really good friends.

4)Haya: At first, the economic situation of the family did not allow them to buy disposable diapers. But little by little, because of the job of the parents, they could buy it and made the life of the baby easier.

5)Nizar: His situation when they came to Spain was similar to Qamar's, but he is a very strong boy and a very good student, so he started to study "Human rights" in Bachillerato and after that he studied the 'Law' career in the university of Madrid, demonstrating that a person who comes from another country could have more capacity than the natives.

This family is just an example of thousands and thousands of families. Let's fight for their rights.

-Anne Frank: she was born to a Jewish family in Germany, and had to flee from her country to the Netherlands.


